Health and Safety

Trainers may choose to take their trainees out into the local area as part of this project. The Road Safety Unit can advise on these activities.

- Trainers and trainees should wear high visibility clothing. You may wish to buy a set of waistcoats or sashes.
- If trainees are observing traffic, ensure they are standing well back from the kerb.
- Trainers should ensure that they are aware of any minimum supervision ratios and ensure that trainees are adequately supervised.

Safer Places to Cross

This section covers all of the different types of "Safer Places". There are 3 main light-controlled crossings:

Pelican (Pedestrian Light Controlled) crossing. This is still the most common light-controlled crossing operated by pressing a button.

Puffin (Pedestrian User Friendly Intelligent) crossing. This is similar to a Pelican Crossing, except that the pedestrian signals are next to the operating button. Detectors vary the length of time pedestrians have to cross and there is no flashing amber light for motorists or flashing green man for pedestrians.

Toucan (two can cross) crossings are found where a cycle lane meets a road. This is the only crossing at which cyclists can ride across. These crossings sometimes have a flashing phase, but not always.

At all of the light-controlled crossings, it is vital that trainees realise they must check that traffic has stopped before they cross, even if the green man is lit.

The other type of controlled crossing is a zebra crossing. Trainees need to understand that they must make sure the traffic has stopped in both directions before they cross.

At all of the crossings, it should be emphasised that you should cross on the stripes or between the studs, not on the zig zags either side of the crossing.

A pedestrian island is another a safer place to cross. It splits the road into two halves and provides a safe refuge in the middle of the road. Each half of the road should be treated as a separate crossing.








Crossing by parked cars should generally be discouraged. It is usually safer to cross away from parked cars. When they are standing near parked cars, people can be hidden from the driver's view and do not have a clear view of roads and traffic. However, many streets are full of parked cars and it is sometimes very difficult to find a place to cross the road away from parked cars.

Trainees need to be able to identify gaps between cars that are of a suitable size. If the gap is large, another car could pull in while the trainee is standing there. There also needs to be a space on the opposite side of the road for the trainee to cross to.

Trainees also need to check that the parked cars they are standing by are not going to move. They can listen for engine noise and look for people sitting in the car, lights and exhaust fumes.



Once trainees have identified a suitable space between parked cars to cross in and checked that the cars near them are not about to move, they need to adopt the following method of crossing:

- Stop near the kerb, between the two parked cars.
- Look "right, left, right" to see if there is any traffic approaching and listen. Trainees may not be able to see approaching traffic but may be able to hear it. If traffic is approaching, wait and let it pass.
- When no traffic is approaching, walk to the outside edge of the car on the left and stop. Trainees should be encouraged to stand by the left-hand car because traffic approaching closest to them from the right will have a clearer view of them.
- When standing at the outside edge of the left-hand car, look "right, left, right" and if there is no traffic approaching, cross straight over the road at a brisk pace.
- If any traffic does appear when trainees are standing at the outside edge of the left-hand car then they should step back onto the pavement and wait for the traffic to pass. The crossing procedure should then be repeated.
- This method of crossing the road near parked cars enables trainees to safely put themselves in a position where they can see oncoming traffic and drivers can see them.

SAFER JOURNEYS

<u>Learning Objectives</u>

- To identify safe places to cross the road.
- To identify hazards in the local environment.
- To plan a safer route for regular journeys.

Resources Required

Camera. Coloured pens/pencils/crayons. Paper, card or book for displaying photos.

<u>Activity</u>

- Identify a journey that the trainee makes regularly e.g. to the shop or bus stop.
- Walk the route with the trainee taking photos of the journey (include return journey as well). Make sure that you include photos of crossing points and danger spots. Discuss ways of coping with the danger spots.
- Produce photos.
- Put the photos in order and discuss the journey with the trainee.
- Stick the photos in order on a sheet of card/paper, a wall display or in a book. Alternatively put the photos in order, punch a hole in the corner and tie together with string or similar.
- Trainees could put a red border around the photos of danger spots to remind them to take extra care at these places.


Activity
